Frequently Asked Questions

Live Session Abstracts

What is a Live Session Abstract?

A Live Session Abstract is selected by the Quality Summit Educational Track Lead for a 60-minute Live Session presentation during one of the breakout sessions.

When is the Abstract Submission Deadline?

Live Session Abstracts are due no later than 11:59 p.m. ET Tuesday, May 27.

Do I need to attend the Quality Summit in Denver, CO to submit a Live Session abstract?

Yes, if your abstract is accepted to be developed into a Live Session, you will be required to attend the Quality Summit in Denver, CO October 14 - 16, 2025.

If I am attending the Quality Summit, am I responsible for associated expenses?

Yes, all expenses (e.g., airfare, lodging, conference registration) associated with the submission and presentation of an abstract are the responsibility of the presenter. ACC does not cover expenses.

When will I know if my abstract has been accepted?

Authors will receive notification on **Tuesday, June 17** regarding the acceptance of their abstract for development into a Live Session.

What is the next step if my abstract has been accepted for a Live Session?

If your abstract is accepted as a Live Session, you will receive an invitation to participate as faculty at the Quality Summit. A Quality Summit Educational Track Lead will reach out to assist you in refining your content into a 60-minute Live Session.

Upon acceptance, you will receive access details for the Faculty Portal, where you will complete various tasks, including:

- Updating your Faculty Profile
- Signing a Media Release Form
- Providing a Short Biography
- Uploading a Headshot
- Registering for the Quality Summit
- Uploading Presentation slides

Additional instructions will be sent to you with your acceptance notification.



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ePoster Abstracts

What is an ePoster Abstract?

An ePoster Abstract goes through an ACC independent review by subject matter experts. Approved ePoster Abstracts are digitally displayed on touchscreen monitors in the Poster Hall as well as on the website and mobile app. ePoster Abstract authors also have the opportunity to showcase their ePoster(s) during a 30 minute "Meet the Author" block.

When is the Abstract Submission Deadline?

Poster Abstracts are due no later than 11:59 p.m. ET Monday, June 23.

Do I need to attend the Quality Summit in Denver, CO to submit an abstract?

While it is not mandatory to attend the Quality Summit to submit an ePoster abstract, we highly encourage it. However, if your abstract ranks among the top 6 based on reviewer ratings, attendance is mandatory to present your ePoster at the Spotlight Theater.

Does the Quality Summit accept previously published or presented abstracts?

Yes, your abstract may include portions of prior abstracts and/or manuscripts submitted or presented elsewhere, if you have obtained appropriate copyright permissions.

To what category should I submit my abstract?

You will select both a Focus Area and a Quality Program when you submit your abstract. To ensure your abstract is appropriately evaluated, be sure to select the category or categories that closely align with its content.

Can I make edits to my abstract after the submission deadline?

No, after the **June 23** submission deadline, abstracts are no longer accessible and therefore may not be revised or resubmitted. If accepted, your abstract will be published as submitted; it cannot be edited after the submission deadline. Proofread abstracts carefully to avoid errors before the submission deadline.



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Can I be a part of the Abstract Review Process?

We invite all career levels in all areas of expertise to volunteer as an abstract reviewer. The abstract review period will take place **July 7 – 21** and will require a time commitment of approximately 1-2 hours. Abstract reviewers will review up to 10 abstracts. Apply here!

What is the Abstract Selection Process?

Abstract Reviewers selected by ACC will independently review, evaluate, and score each abstract using the following criteria:

Abstract Criteria	Description	Evaluation Criteria
Content and Significance	The extent to which the abstract clearly identifies the goals of the project, its outcomes, and the methods and tools that are used to assess the outcomes. Further, there is a logical sequence of information. The extent to which the project presents significant information about process innovation, quality improvement of cardiovascular care, and education or research achieved with NCDR/Accreditation data, along with whether the conclusions are substantiated by the data and/or are consistent with the title of the abstract. If the abstract is a research project, it includes a hypothesis, correct methods to evaluate the hypothesis, and correct conclusions drawn.	Overall Grade 10 = Outstanding 9 = Excellent 8 = Very Good 7 = Good 6 = Above Average
Relevance	The extent to which the topic addresses current opportunities in the ACC Quality program and are relevant to NCDR/Accreditation or general quality improvement, applicable to other settings, and are of interest to other participants.	5 = Average 4 = Below Average 3 = Weak
Originality	How original is the concept presented in this abstract? Or, how original is the new approach to an old problem? Abstracts should be an original idea, concept, or an improvement or revision of a previous idea.	2 = Questionable 1 = Not Acceptable (would probably not contribute to the work of other NCDR/Accreditation participants or other CV Team members, potentially confusing and/or misleading)
Presentation Quality	Clarity of the project presented, including goals, processes implemented, and expected and observed outcomes. The abstract should be presented in a clear, concise, and well-structured way, with proper use of language and a title that reflects the contents of the story.	



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Your abstract's final score is the mean of all submitted scores. Abstracts may be rejected by the reviewers for the following reasons:

- The content of the abstract is not relevant to ACC Quality Summit attendees.
- The abstract did not contain enough information to qualify for acceptance.
- The abstract scored low on the evaluation criteria.
- The abstract authors did not complete a disclosure.

When will I know if my abstract has been accepted?

Authors will receive notification on **Friday, July 25** regarding the acceptance of their abstract for development into an ePoster.

What is the next step if my abstract has been accepted?

If your abstract is accepted for development as an ePoster, we will email the presenting author additional instructions with details on uploading your ePoster, completing an author profile, and recording a short presentation in the ePoster system.

You ePoster must be submitted in PDF format no later than 11:59 PM ET Monday, August 25.

Do I need to print a physical copy of my ePoster?

No, you do not need to print your ePoster in any format. ePosters will be digitally displayed on touchscreen monitors in the Poster Hall as well as on the website and mobile app.

Will there be designated times for authors to meet with attendees and discuss their ePosters?

Yes, to allow authors time to interact directly with attendees, we have added "Meet the Author" sessions to the agenda. These sessions are 30-minute blocks where authors will be present in the Poster Hall to discuss their ePoster and answer attendee questions. If you plan to attend the Quality Summit, you will be assigned to a specific "Meet the Author Session"
